How To Use the Texas Register

Texas Register

The *Texas Register* (ISN 0362-4781) is published twice a week at least 100 times a year. Issues will be published on every Tuesday and Friday in 1983 with the exception of January 25, March 8, April 26, and November 29, by the Office of the Secretary of State, 201 East 14th Street, P. O. Box 13824, Austin, Texas 78711-3824, (512) 475-7886.

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Information Available: The nine sections of the *Register* represent various facets of state government. Documents contained within them include

- Governor - appointments, executive orders, and proclamations
- Secretary of State - summaries of opinions based on election laws
- Attorney General - summaries of requests for opinions, opinions, and open records decisions
- Emergency Rules - rules adopted by state agencies on an emergency basis
- Proposed Rules - rules proposed for adoption
- Withdrawn Rules - rules withdrawn by state agencies from consideration for adoption, or automatically withdrawn by the Texas Register six months after proposal publication date
- Adopted Rules - rules adopted following a 30-day public comment period
- Legislature - Bills submitted to, signed by, and vetoed by the Governor and bills that are submitted to the Governor and enacted without his signature
- Open Meetings - notices of open meetings
- In Addition - miscellaneous information required to be published by statute or provided as a public service

Specific explanations on the contents of each section can be found on the beginning page of the section. The division also publishes monthly, quarterly, and annual indexes to aid in researching material published.

How To Cite: Material published in the *Texas Register* is referenced by citing the volume in which a document appears, the words "TexReg," and the beginning page number on which

that document was published. For example, a document published on page 2402 of Volume 6 (1981) is cited as follows: 6 TexReg 2402.

In order that readers may cite material more easily, page numbers are now written as citations. Example: page 2 in the lower left-hand corner of this page is written: "8 TexReg 2 issue date." While on the opposite page, in the lower right-hand corner, page 3 is written "issue date 8 TexReg 3."

How To Research: The public is invited to research rules and information of interest between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. weekdays at the *Texas Register* office, 503E Sam Houston Building, Austin. Material can be found by using *Register* indexes, the *Texas Administrative Code* (explained below), rule number, or TRD number.

Texas Administrative Code

The *Texas Administrative Code* (TAC) is the approved, collected volumes of Texas administrative rules currently being published by Shepard's/McGraw-Hill, in cooperation with this office.

How To Cite: Under the TAC scheme, each agency rule is designated by a TAC number. For example, in the citation 1 TAC §27.15:

1 indicates the title under which the agency appears in the *Texas Administrative Code* (a listing of all the titles appears below);

TAC stands for the *Texas Administrative Code*;

§27.15 is the section number of the rule (27 indicates that the rule is under Chapter 27 of Title 1; 15 represents the individual rule within the chapter).

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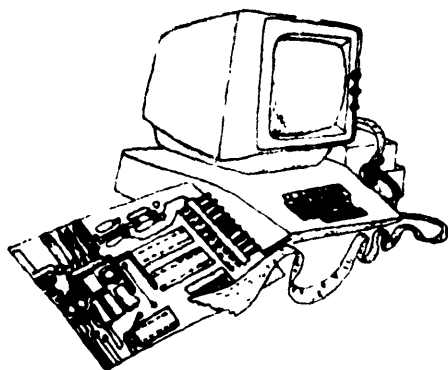
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Proposed Rules

Before an agency may permanently adopt a new or amended rule, or repeal an existing rule, a proposal detailing the action must be published in the *Register* at least 30 days before any action may be taken. The 30-day time period gives interested persons an opportunity to review and make oral or written comments on the rule. A public hearing on the proposal may also be granted if such a procedure is requested by a governmental subdivision or agency, or by an association consisting of at least 25 members.

The proposal, as published in the *Register*, must include a brief explanation of the proposed action; a fiscal statement indicating effect on state or local government, a statement explaining anticipated public benefits and possible economic costs to individuals required to comply with the rule; a request for public comments, a statement of statutory authority under which the proposed rule is to be adopted (and the agency's interpretation of the statutory authority); the text of the proposed action; and a certification statement. The certification information, which includes legal authority, the proposed date of adoption or the earliest possible date that the agency may file notice to adopt the proposal, and a telephone number to call for further information, follows each submission.

TITLE 16. ECONOMIC REGULATION Part IV. Texas Department of Labor and Standards Chapter 65. Boiler Division Heating Boilers

16 TAC §65.88

The Texas Department of Labor and Standards proposes amendments to §65.88, concerning bottom blowdown or drain valve.

Steven M. Matthews, boiler division director and chief inspector, has determined that for the first five-year period the rule will be in effect there will be no fiscal implications for state or local government as a result of enforcing or administering the rule.

Mr. Matthews also has determined that for each year of the first five years the rule as proposed is in effect the public benefit anticipated as a result of enforcing the rule as proposed will be safer mechanical requirements for boiler units. There is no anticipated economic cost to individuals who are required to comply with the rule as proposed.

Comments on the proposal may be submitted to Barbara Stoll, Boiler Division, P.O. Box 12157, Austin, Texas 78711.

The amendments are proposed under the Texas Boiler Inspection Law, Article 5221c, §6, which provides the commissioner with the authority to enforce a code of rules for the operation of boilers in Texas.

§65.88 **Bottom Blowoff (Blowdown) or Drain Valve**

(a) **Bottom Blowoff Valve**. Each boiler shall have a bottom **blowoff** [blowdown or drain pipe] connection [fitted with a valve or cock connected] to the lowest water space practicable]. The] **with a minimum size** [of blowdown piping and valves shall be] as shown in the following table[.]. **The discharge piping shall be full size to the point of discharge. Boilers having a capacity of 25 gallons or less are exempt from these requirements.**

Note:

To determine the discharge capacity of safety relief valves in terms of Btu, the relieving capacity in lbs. of steam/hr. is multiplied by 1,000.

(b) **Drain valve.** Each boiler shall have one or more drain connections, fitted with valves or cocks connecting to the lowest water containing spaces. The minimum size of the drain piping, valves, and cocks shall be 3/4 inches. The discharge piping shall be full size to the point of discharge. When the blowoff connection is located at the lowest water containing space, a separate drain connection is not required. [Discharge piping connected to bottom blowdown and/or bottom drain connection shall be full size to the point of discharge.]

(c) **Minimum pressure rating.** The minimum pressure rating of valves and cocks used for blowoff or drain purposes shall be at least equal to the pressure stamped on the boiler, but in no case less than 30 psi. The temperature rating of such valves and cocks shall not be less than 250° F. [The minimum pressure rating of blowdown and drain valves or cocks or both shall be equal to the pressure stamped on the boiler but in no case less than 30 psi (207 kPa). The temperature rating of such valves or cocks or both shall be not less than 250° F (121° C).]

Part IV. State Commission for the Blind

Chapter 167. Business Enterprises Program

40 TAC §167.3

The State Commission for the Blind proposes amendments to §167.3, concerning the commission's Business Enterprises Program manual. The Commission for the Blind is federally mandated to issue program rules and regulations by the United States Code, Title 20, Chapter 6A, §107b, and by 34 Code of Federal Regulations §395.4. The proposed amendments are adopted by reference under the provisions of Texas Civil Statutes, Article 6252-13a, §10.

William H. Davidson, Business Enterprises Program director, has determined that for the first five-year period the rule will be in effect there will be no fiscal implications for state or local government as a result of enforcing or administering the rule.

Mr. Davidson also has determined that for each year of the first five years the rule as proposed is in effect the public benefit anticipated as a result of enforcing the rule as proposed will be an up-to-date manual for individual Business Enterprises Program operators which consolidates all program rules and regulations. There is no anticipated economic cost to individuals who are required to comply with the rule as proposed.

Comments on the proposal may be submitted to William H. Davidson, Director, Business Enterprises Program, State Commission for the Blind, P.O. Box 12866, Austin, Texas 78711.

The amendments are proposed under the United States Code, Title 20, Chapter 6A, §107b, which provides the State Commission for the Blind with the authority to issue these rules and regulations; and under Texas Civil Statutes, Article 6252-13a, §10, which allow the State Commission for the Blind to adopt regulations by reference.

§167.3. *Business Enterprises Manual.* The State Commission for the Blind adopts by reference the rule contained in its *Business Enterprises Manual*, as amended on October 1, 1983. This document is published by and available from the State Commission for the Blind, P.O. Box 12866, Austin, Texas 78711

Adopted Rules

An agency may take final action on a rule 30 days after a proposal has been published in the *Register*. The rule becomes effective 20 days after the agency files the correct document with the *Texas Register*, unless a later date is specified or unless a federal statute or regulation requires implementation of the action on shorter notice.

The document, as published in the *Register*, must indicate whether the rule is adopted with or without changes to the proposal. The notice must also include paragraphs which: explain the legal justification for the rule; how the rule will function; contain comments received on the proposal; list parties submitting comments for and against the rule; explain why the agency disagreed with suggested changes; and contain the agency's interpretation of the statute under which the rule was adopted.

If an agency adopts the rule without any changes to the proposed text, only the preamble of the notice and statement of legal authority will be published. The text of the rule, as appropriate, will be published only if final action is taken with alterations to the proposal. The certification information, following the submission, contains the effective date of the final action, the proposal's publication date, and a telephone number to call for further information.

TITLE 1. ADMINISTRATION Part V. State Purchasing and General Services Commission Chapter 111. Executive Administration Division Administration

1 TAC §111.3

The State Purchasing and General Services Commission adopts amendments to §111.3, without changes to the proposed text published in the June 24, 1983, issue of the *Texas Register* (8 TexReg 2157).

The commission rules are based upon policy determinations that existing contracts will not be voided absent a clear showing that applicable law or rules were violated in the award of that contract. Not being an adjudicative body, the commissioners wished to consider an appeal where a contract has already been awarded, only where a strong indication existed that applicable law or the commission's rules had been violated in the award of that contract.

To make a clear showing that applicable law or commission rules had been violated, initial opinion will be required of the general counsel, with the concurrence of the executive director. The commissioners will not hear an appeal unless the general counsel is of the opinion that a violation has occurred and the executive director agrees, or is not certain.

No comments were received regarding adoption of the amendments.

The amendments are adopted pursuant to Texas Civil Statutes, Article 601b, Article 2, which provide the commissioners with the authority to manage the affairs of the commission through the executive director, with final authority resting with the commissioners. Appeals from actions of the staff in contract matters are an appropriate exercise of that authority.

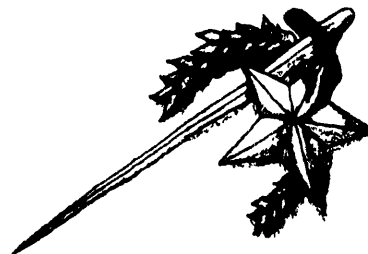

**Chapter 69. Manufactured Housing
Modular Home Installations**

16 TAC §69.153

The Texas Department of Labor and Standards adopts amendments to §69.153, with changes to the proposed text published in the February 22, 1983, issue of the *Texas Register* (8 TexReg 589).

The manufactured housing industry needs a uniform set of rules for the modular housing industry. The rule will make consistent standards for modular housing manufactured in the State of Texas.

Several people commented in favor of the rules but were concerned about local autonomy and discretion in relation to the modular manufacturing industry. Concerns were also expressed about local geographical differences and local code variations.

On April 7, 1983, a public hearing was held to consider any comments on the proposed amendments to §69.153.

Those who were present and testified for adoption of the Uniform Building Code (UBC) and the Southern Building Code Congress International (SBCCI) were Will Ehrle, Texas Manufactured Housing Association; William Tangye, Southern Building Code Congress; Bruce Walters, Modular Technology, Inc.; Michael R. Coker, City of Lubbock; R. L. Stephenson, Southern Gas Association; Gail Graves, City of Richardson; Stanley Kidd, City of Beaumont, Golden Triangle and SBCCI;

Don Fox, City of Victoria; James C. Hunt, City of El Paso; and C. Lalo Flores, City of McAllen.

Those who testified for the adoption of the UBC only were Bill Farish, Brinkcraft; John Samples, Modular Technology, Inc.; and Doug McCoy, Engineering Consultant.

Those who testified for no change to the present code were Alford A. Cook, Texas State Association of Electrical Workers; Walter Timberlake, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW) Local 520; and Ray Cleveland, Electrical Board, Austin.

Fred W. Allen, South Texas Chapter, National Electrical Contractors Association (NECA), also was present and testified for no aluminum wiring, a minimum of #12 conductor, and the use of conduit throughout.

Written comments or rebuttals were taken until April 18, 1983. The following comments were received.

James C. Hunt, City of El Paso, was for adoption of the UBC and SBCCI. Bill Farish, Lancer Homes, was for adoption of the UBC or SBCCI and the National Electrical Code (NEC) with no amendments.

John Freeman and Christine White, both of Landmark Laboratories, Ltd., were for retention of the one and

two family dwelling code only. Richard Makover, Makeover/Levy Associates Architects Planners, and Linda W. McGarity, McGarity, Fehn & Associates, were for adoption of the UBC.

Those who were for no change to the present code were Aubrey Rummel, NECA; Jack Veazy, IBEW Local Union 850; H. R. Holder, IBEW Local Union 460; I. N. Byerley, NECA; John Temple Ligon, Ligon & Company; and Gerald J. Pascador, P. E., City of Corpus Christi.

Gene B. Endthoff, City of Odessa, and Clarence R. Bechtel, Building Officials & Code Administrators International, Inc. (BOCA), were for adoption of the BOCA Basic Building Code, the SBCCI, and the UBC. Jose V. Martinez, Valley Building Officials Association, and Don F. Fox, City of Victoria, were for adoption of the SBCCI only.

The agency has agreed with some of the changes, and some of the changes made in this adoption are reflected from the public hearing.

The amendments are adopted under the Texas Manufactured Housing Act, Article 5221f, which authorizes the commissioner to promulgate rules to effectuate the Act.

§69.153. Modular Codes and Standards.

(a) The Manufactured Housing Division of the Department of Labor and Standards herein adopts by reference the following codes and standards:

(1) One and Two Family Dwelling Code, 1979 Edition, Building Officials and Code Administrators International, Inc., Southern Building Code Congress International, and International Conference of Building Officials: Part II—Building Planning; Part III—Construction; Part IV—Mechanical; Part V—Plumbing; Part VII—Standards. As the scope of these standards is broader than originally envisioned by the One and Two Family Dwelling Code, the following alterations have been made to the One and Two Family Dwelling Code. Delete sections R-101, R-102, R-103, R-104, R-105, R-106, R-107, R-109, R-110, R-111, R-111.2, R-112, R-113, R-203, M-1904, Chapter 25, third paragraph of Section P-2003, and the third paragraph of R-207.

(2) National Electrical Code, 1981 Edition, National Fire Protection Association.

(3) (No change.)

(4) The Uniform Building Code, 1982 Edition; Uniform Mechanical Code, 1982 Edition, the Uniform Plumbing Code, 1982 Edition; International Conference of Building Officials.

(5) The Standard Building Code, 1982 Edition; the Standard Mechanical Code, 1982 Edition; the Standard Plumbing Code, 1982 Edition; the Standard Gas Code, 1982 Edition; Southern Building Code Congress International.

(6) These codes and standards may be obtained as follows:

(A) National Electrical Code, 1981 Edition, from the National Fire Protection Association, 470 Atlantic Avenue, Boston, Massachusetts 02210.

(B) (No change.)

(C) Model Code for Energy Conservation in New Building Construction from the National Conference of States on Building Codes and Standards, 481 Carlisle Drive, Herndon, Virginia 22070.

(D) Uniform Building Code, Uniform Plumbing Code, Uniform Mechanical Code, International Conference of Building Officials, 5360 South Workman Mill Road, Whittier, California 90601.

(E) Standard Building Code, Standard Mechanical Code, Standard Plumbing Code, Standard Gas Code, Southern Building Code Congress International, Inc., 900 Montclair Road, Birmingham, Alabama 35213.

(b) Modular residential structures which exceed three stories in height or which are designed for the separate living use of more than two families shall be designed and constructed in compliance with the herein referenced Uniform Building Code, Uniform Plumbing Code, and Uniform Mechanical Code; or the Standard Building Code, Standard Plumbing Code, Standard Mechanical Code, and Standard Gas Code; the Model Code for Energy Conservation in New Building Construction; and the National Electrical Code.

(1) If the Uniform Building Code or the Standard Building Code is the building code in effect in the municipality where the modular structure covered by the provisions of this section is to be erected, the manufacturer shall design and construct the modular structure to the model code applicable to that municipality but without amendments.

(2) If the municipality in which the modular structure covered by the provisions of this section is to be erected does not utilize either the Uniform Building Code or the Standard Building Code, then the authorized representative of that municipality shall determine whether the Uniform Building Code or the Standard Building Code, without amendments, will be utilized for the design and construction of the modular structure to be erected in the municipality.

(3) If the municipality in which the modular structure covered by the provisions of this section is to be erected does not have an established building code, or if the modular structure is to be erected in an unincorporated area, the manufacturer shall designate to its Design Review Agency for Texas (DRAT) whether the Uniform Building Code or the Standard Building Code is to be utilized for the design and construction of the modular structure.

(4) All modular structures covered by the provisions of this subsection (b) shall be designed and constructed in accordance with the herein referenced National Electrical Code, 1981 Edition; except that all amendments to the National Electrical Code in effect in the municipality where the modular structure is to be erected shall apply fully to the electrical design and construction of the modular structure. If the municipality in which the modular structure covered by the provisions of this section is to be erected does not have an established electrical code, or if the modular structure is to be erected in an unincorporated area, the National Electrical Code, 1981 Edition, without amendments, shall be used.

(5) All modular structures covered by the provisions of this section shall be designed and constructed

according to the requirements of the herein referenced Model Code for Energy Conservation in New Building Construction.

(c) Modular structures designed for one or two family residential dwellings, not to exceed three stories in height, shall be constructed in accordance with the previously referenced One and Two Family Dwelling Code, the 1981 National Electrical Code, and the Model Code for Energy Conservation.

(d) Family dwelling units separated by a two-hour fire wall are separate structures for the purpose of this rule, providing the structure does not exceed two stories in height.

This agency hereby certifies that the rule as adopted has been reviewed by legal counsel and found to be a valid exercise of the agency's legal authority.

Chapter 79. Legal Services

Subchapter F. Contract Administration

40 TAC §79.505

The Texas Department of Human Resources adopts amendments to §79.505, with changes to the proposed text published in the July 8, 1983, issue of the *Texas Register* (8 TexReg 2556).

The changes to the proposed amendments include changing the title of §79.505 from "Advance Payments for Social Services" to "Advance Payment for Contracted Social Services." This change more accurately reflects the purpose of the rule. Subsection (a)(8) is also changed to add "Beginning September 1983."

The amendments are necessary to clarify the department's policy about advance payments to providers. They eliminate the requirement that advance payments be liquidated at the end of the state fiscal year, add the definition of a contract period, and clarify the definition of a provider agency.

No comments were received regarding adoption of the amendments.

The amendments are adopted under the Human Resources Code, Title 2, Chapter 22, which authorizes the department to administer public assistance programs.

§79.505. Advance Payment for Contracted Social Services.

(a) The department may make advance payments to provider agencies for contracted social services subject to the following limitations:

(1) The provider agency must be a private, non-profit legal entity.

(2)-(7) (No change.)

(8) Beginning September 1983, the provider agency must liquidate the advance payment at the end of each contract period consistent with the terms of each specific contract, or at other times determined necessary by the department. For the purposes of this rule, contract period means the period beginning with the contract effective date and ending with the contract termination date.

(9) The department stops making advance payments to a provider agency if the provider agency has not liquidated the advance payment for the previously contracted period according to the terms of the contract.

(b) (No change.)

This agency hereby certifies that the rule as adopted has been reviewed by legal counsel and found to be a valid exercise of the agency's legal authority.

Open Meetings

Agencies with statewide jurisdiction must give at least seven days notice before an impending meeting. Institutions of higher education or political subdivisions covering all or part of four or more counties (regional agencies) must post notice at least 72 hours prior to a scheduled meeting time. Although some notices may be received too late for publication before the meeting is held, all those filed are published in the *Register*. Notices concerning state agencies, colleges, and universities must contain the date, time, and location of the meeting, and an agenda or agenda summary. Published notices concerning county agencies include only the date, time, and location of the meeting. These notices are published alphabetically under the heading "Regional Agencies" according to the date on which they are filed.

Any of the governmental entities named above must have notice of an emergency meeting, or an emergency revision to an agenda, and the reason for such emergency posted for at least two hours before the meeting is convened. Emergency meeting notices filed by all governmental agencies will be published. However, notices of emergency additions or revisions to a regional agency's agenda will not be published since the original agenda for the agency was not published.

All notices are posted on the bulletin board outside the Office of the Secretary of State on the first floor of the East Wing in the State Capitol. These notices may contain more detailed agendas than space allows to be published in the *Register*.

Comptroller of Public Accounts Decision 12,677

For copies of the following opinion, contact Bob Bullock, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Attention: Administrative Law Judges, 111 East 17th Street, Austin, Texas 78774. Copies will be furnished without charge and edited to comply with confidentiality statutes.

Summary of Decision. The petitioner used an accrual method of accounting in its financial transactions during the year. At year's end, the petitioner made adjusting entries thereby reflecting its financial condition on a cash basis of accounting. The petitioner contended that the cash basis of accounting could be used for the purpose of determining its taxable capital and computing its franchise tax. The comptroller held that such practice is specifically prohibited by 34 TAC §3.391(b)(1). Furthermore, *Southwestern Motor Transport, Inc. v. Bullock*, 614 SW 2d 640 (Texas Civ. Appeals, Austin 1981) holds that in determining franchise tax liability, a taxpayer using a generally accepted accounting practice (accrual method) is precluded from using another method of accounting that is not generally accepted (cash method).

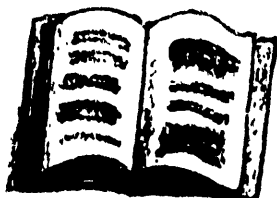

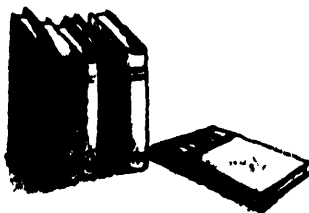

Texas Department of Water Resources Consultant Proposal Request

This consultant proposal request is filed in compliance with Texas Civil Statutes, Article 6252-11c.

Description. In support of the State Oil and Hazardous Substances Pollution Contingency Plan and specifically Part II which provides for local contingency plans, the Texas Department of Water Resources (TDWR) is currently soliciting proposals for the preparation of basemaps and compilation of support information which will ultimately assist spill response decision making and planning efforts.

The preparation of basemaps, which consist of 198 highway department (one inch equals two miles) maps representing 170 Texas counties, will primarily involve plotting the geographic locations of logistical and environmental features onto work maps and recording corresponding support information. The locations of specific features and corresponding information will be gleaned from available data sources provided by the TDWR.

Completed work maps containing plotted features and corresponding support information for each plot will be field checked by TDWR personnel and returned to the contractor for corrections, transfer of verified features onto registered overlays, and the attachment of a standardized map legend to each county master sheet. Legends will be prepared by the contractor with input on design and format provided by TDWR project personnel.

The following items will be provided by the TDWR to the contractor:

- (1) all work maps and cronoflex county map sheets (master and water);
- (2) templates with symbols for features of interest;
- (3) data file (excluding water intakes and aviation facilities);
- (4) coding sheets for support information; and
- (5) mapping guidelines and information document.

Detailed specifications and guidelines are contained in the mapping guidelines and information document which can be provided to intending proposers upon request.

Review Criteria and Procedures. Evaluation of the submitted proposals will be based on the following criteria which must be addressed and are not necessarily listed in relative order of importance:

- (1) demonstrated knowledge of work to be performed;
- (2) qualifications and experience of project staff;
- (3) commitment of physical facilities to successfully complete the work;
- (4) project management; and
- (5) reasonableness of proposed budget and time schedule.

The TDWR will award the contract to the consultant considered to be the best qualified to perform the work and also reserves the right to reject, in total or in part, any or all proposals.

Deadline and Address for Proposal Submission. Three copies of the proposal must be received no later than 5 p.m. on September 23, 1983. 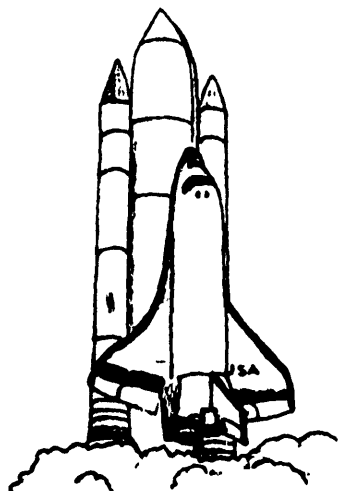

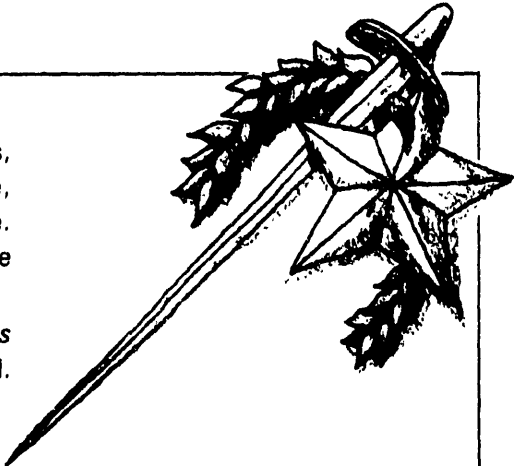
