#### FIVE THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW RIGHT NOW

- 1 Texans are talking. Public outreach for the Trans-Texas Corridor may be the largest public involvement effort in the nation's history. More than 200 public meetings on the TTC have already been held. In the first two months of 2008, there will be 11 Town Hall Meetings and 46 Public Hearings regarding the corridor and I-69/TTC.
- 2 Money is tight. Inflation and a scaling back of government resources are the major reasons TxDOT has a cash flow challenge. In the last five years, highway construction costs in Texas have skyrocketed 62 percent; in the last 10 years, they have jumped 100 percent.
- 3 Competition works. Through a competitive process for the right to build SH 121 in Collin and Denton Counties, more than \$3 billion was provided to local officials to pay for other transportation projects. This region of the state will be building new projects while most of the rest will downshift to a maintenance mode.
  - New leadership means new opportunities. TxDOT's new administrative structure was developed to better serve the public and the department, support a more effective operation and contribute to overall cost reductions.

### **Seeing Eye to Eye**

Do-it-yourself projects around the home and yard can create hazards to the eye from chemicals, dust, or flying objects. Just like at work, you should always wear good eye protection whenever you engage in home improvement projects around the house.



We talked to our Occupational Safety Division and they offered the following advice:



Safety glasses, which can be fitted with prescription lenses, look similar to regular eyeglasses but have impact-resistant lenses.



Face shields protect the entire face as well as the eyes from frontal impacts; however, they do not offer good protection from the sides. You may want to use them with goggles for maximum protection.



## **Get Ready for Spring Planting**

As stewards of roughly 800,000 acres of state right of way, it's possible that TxDOT maintains the world's largest "garden." Last year, we planted more than 385,641 trees, shrubs and groundcovers on highway landscape projects. These projects are carefully planned and utilize native and naturalized plants that can withstand the extreme Texas temperatures, varying amounts of rainfall and wide range of soil conditions.



Use our best practices at TxDOT to plan your own yard. Consider these basic questions:

#### How do you intend to use the space?

If you enjoy backyard entertaining, you might extend your patio space or consider a deck and an overhead structure. Do you have play space for young children or pets? Think about how you will use the space before you begin your design.

#### What is your style?

Define your look early on. If you prefer simple, natural and unstructured spaces, your style may be less formal and could involve curved edges. Do you like structure and symmetry? A more formal design might incorporate planting beds laid out at 90-degree angles.

#### Which plant materials are best?

Use native and naturalized plant materials whenever possible. typically need less fertilizing, pruning, irrigation and overall pampering. Call your nearest Texas Agricultural Extension Agent for a list of native plant materials in your area of the state.

#### What kind of soil do you have?

Learn more about your soil type before you choose your native plant materials. Clay soils don't drain well; sandy soils don't hold moisture. Adding compost will improve drainage and hold moisture longer so less water will be required.

#### Should you consider an irrigation system? Using drought-tolerant natives and reducing your turf area will reduce

the need for water. Call your local water utility for tips on using drip irrigation and the proper installation, use and maintenance of an in-ground sprinkler system.

#### What level of maintenance is required?

Most agree that the perfect landscape is high impact and low maintenance. Consider less turf, plants require less pruning, and use plenty of mulch in planting beds to discourage weeds.

Sketch out some ideas first and begin to prioritize areas of your yard. Don't be overwhelmed by thinking you have to do it all this season. Consider your priority list and tackle one area at a time. Happy gardening! n

# El Paso District blazes trail with innovative Spur 601 project





In many parts of the country, people still think West Texas is about sleepy towns, wide open spaces and laid-back folks who do things the old-fashioned way. It's high time they visit El Paso.

This burgeoning border town is anything but sleepy, suffers from growing traffic congestion and boasts a sizeable contingent of progressive transportation planners who call the city home. With the Spur 601 project, approved in 2006, TxDOT's El Paso District is partnering with local leaders to blaze new trails in innovative project financing.

Thanks to a cooperative effort among TxDOT, the Camino Real Regional Mobility Authority (RMA) and the private sector, a unique "pass-through" financing project to construct Spur 601 is under way. TxDOT has contracted an agreement with a private company - J.D. Abrams, L.P. - to finance, design and build a new, more direct connection between east and northeast El Paso. Construction of the seven-mile project, which joins US 54 to Loop 375 (Purple Heart Memorial Highway), begins this fall at a price tag of \$367 million.

"This innovative agreement brings private investment to El Paso to build a badly needed transportation project faster than the state ever could by itself," said Texas Transportation Commissioner Ted Houghton.

Why the urgency? El Paso is home to Fort Bliss, which houses more than 10,000 soldiers and their families. The massive, nationwide base realignment is expected to increase the base population to more than 50,000. El Paso's current transportation infrastructure simply cannot absorb the high traffic impact of the pending base realignment.

TxDOT will contribute \$45 million in traditional funding, while the El Paso International Airport will put up another \$10 million. Citigroup Financial Services is underwriting the bond issue on behalf of the Camino Real RMA. The required documents have been submitted to the rating agencies and a financial closing is expected by late January 2008. Once finalized, the Spur 601 project will be the first transportation project in the U.S. financed by a pass-through agreement using private sector funding. El Paso District Engineer Chuck Berry added that the project was negotiated as a fixed-cost deliverable.

"We will pay the negotiated price and no more. The private sector will assume all the risks if project costs are higher or if the project isn't delivered on time," he noted.

The new funding tool means the project will be built by 2010 rather than 2020 or later, which was the plan under traditional funding. Because the total funding needed to construct Spur 601 is available up front, the project can be completed in just three years and should coincide with the expected influx of the soldiers and their families.

Over time, the state will reimburse the private company for each vehicle that travels on Spur 601. Importantly, drivers will not pay any toll fees to use the highway. An inventory of the number of vehicles using the highway will be tracked by cameras placed along the road. A maximum and minimum payment will be set to ensure accurate payments are made in times where traffic may be unusually slow or unusually heavy. Not only will the use of pass-through financing facilitate the movement of over 50,000 soldiers and their families, it will also help alleviate the truck traffic congestion El Paso experiences from the airport's Air Cargo Center. The project will further relieve congestion that inner-city streets would experience and ensure that commerce remains free-flowing for the forwardthinking citizens of El Paso. n

# Highway Airwayes

Cue the music. In 3, 2, 1...

"It's another great Friday at 1420 KGNB New Braunfels and we welcome you to another 'On the Road Again Show' with TxDOT Area Engineer Greg Malatek," booms radio show host and news director David Ferguson. "Welcome Greg. How's it going out there on the roads?" With lively intro banter, the two start another half-hour show about transportation happenings in the New Braunfels area.



For the past five years, Malatek has dedicated the middle part of his Fridays to talking with residents in reach of radio station KGNB's airwaves. Even though he jokes about letting the show fade into a distant memory, he explains how much the show has helped him work hand-in-hand with New Braunfels citizens, especially during the 12-year I-35 construction.

"The I-35 widening was a huge project for TxDOT and this community," Malatek said. "We had to do the work in phases and so we were constantly affecting the flow of traffic somewhere in the area. The radio show helped us keep folks informed about the changes before they happened. That really helped people get around a little better and gave our contractors the ability to get their work done, too."

Malatek said Ferguson approached him about doing the show as part of the radio station's efforts to bring newsmakers into the studio to talk about local issues. The \$250 million project definitely qualified as a highprofile development in the heart of New Braunfels. The easy-going engineer is thankful he accepted, even though it was with a little reluctance.

"In the beginning, my voice was cracking and I was scared to death," Malatek remembered. "But it helped us put a voice and face on the agency and that translated into building some trust. I think the fact that I wasn't too slick let people know I was just trying to answer questions and that TxDOT was really listening to what they had to say."

Ferguson agrees. "Greg is very approachable and that comes across on the radio and that's been great for our listeners. I get to harangue him every now and then and everyone knows that a good controversy makes for good radio. But after the show, Greg knows I respect what he and his colleagues are doing for our city."

Perhaps Malatek's focused but unassuming style is derived from his less than glamorous beginning

at TxDOT. His father worked at the Highway Department while he was a college student and urged his son to talk to the supervisor at the Gonzales maintenance yard. He got the summer job and began work mowing grass, cleaning restrooms and taking out the trash. He eventually got into some of the engineering work in the Yoakum office.

"That was some pretty tough work back then but I truly enjoyed the people and the work they were doing so TxDOT was always a consideration when I graduated from college," Malatek said. "I was fortunate to land a job at TxDOT and began my career doing special projects in Austin. From there I worked in the research office and then as a design engineer in Amarillo. In 1994, I landed the assistant's job here in New Braunfels and have been here ever since."

In addition to the work going on in Comal County, Malatek has also recently picked up responsibility for Kendall, Guadalupe and Wilson Counties. While he doesn't have radio shows in those counties, he uses the same communications approach to getting TxDOT's work done there.

"We work as closely with the county judges, city mayors and other community leaders as possible," Malatek noted. "People want to be informed up front and we encourage that type of discussion. In the long run, it helps us do a better job."

Away from the office, Malatek likes to focus on his family. There are Cub Scout meetings, sporting events and Sunday school to attend. For Greg, a jog through historic Landa Park in

New Braunfels eases the pressures of overseeing transportation construction and maintenance in four growing counties.

"This job is truly rewarding. It's a proud moment when I get to take my sons out to a construction site or show them something Daddy helped build. I work with a lot of great people and we're helping our communities move forward."

You can hear that pride travel through the radio every Friday at 12:30 as KGNB 1420 welcomes Greg Malatek to another "On the Road Again" show.

#### **OVER THE FENCE**

- O Aren't toll roads just a form of double-taxation?
- A If a roadway completely paid for itself, then someone might be able to make that case. However, we are hard pressed to find a tax-built road in Texas that pays for itself.

The toll revenues collected are used to pay for construction and ongoing maintenance of the tolled highway. The good news is that toll dollars can also be combined with some tax dollars to help fund the maintenance and expansion of non-tolled projects.

Taxes are not optional. Tolls are optional. Those who choose to use a toll road pay for that choice. Motorists who do not want to use a toll road will always have a non-tolled, tax-funded highway to use.

- O Aren't public-private partnerships a way to guarantee large profits for private road building companies?
- A Public-private partnerships do offer private companies an opportunity to invest in a public transportation project. However, they must be willing to invest hundreds of millions of dollars of their own money to build the project with the thought that drivers will be willing to pay to use the road.

There is no guarantee that a private investor will make money on a privately funded toll road.

Because a private investor is taking that risk and not using public dollars, the company should be allowed to make a reasonable profit on that investment. The State of Texas can regulate the amount of tolls travelers pay on a privately funded road. That limits the profits that a private investor can make.



# Saenz of the Times

TxDOT's new Executive Director Amadeo Saenz is taking over the leadership position at one of the most important junctures in TxDOT's history. There are serious decisions to be made about the direction of transportation for Texas in the near future. TN sat down with the 29-year TxDOT veteran to get his candid views on what Texas and TxDOT need to do now that we're at that proverbial "fork in the road" regarding transportation choices for Texans.

TN – Congratulations on being named Executive Director at TxDOT. Tell us a little about how you found your way into transportation.

Saenz - Thanks for the kind words. As long as I can remember, I've always been fascinated with transportation. Even growing up on our family farm and ranch in South Texas, I was interested in how the cotton that we grew got from the fields to market. When I went to college, I wanted to study engineering and looked for something flexible in that field because structures, design and even geotechnical work interested me. Civil engineering is where I landed. After school, I applied with TxDOT and was offered a job the day of the interview. It wasn't too long after that I began working in the Pharr District. I was able to work in the various functional areas and really enjoyed absorbing as much knowledge about TxDOT operations as possible.

TN - You've held many high-profile jobs at TxDOT, but becoming executive director must have its own set of challenges. How is your transition going?

Saenz – I feel very good about it and everyone has been supportive. We've been getting our team together and setting out priorities for the year. These next 12 months are key for the organization for a variety of reasons. Before the next legislative session in 2009, we must work through some very complex issues with our legislative leaders and the people of Texas as well. The future of transportation in Texas could very well be dictated in 2008.

**TN** – So our TN cover with the "fork in the road" is fairly accurate.

Saenz - It's very accurate.

**TN** – Let's talk about some of those issues. What are the top challenges in front of you and the agency?

Saenz – First, we'll be addressing the sunset provisions in TxDOT's enabling legislation. I'm really looking forward to working with the folks who will be evaluating our organization and I see this as an opportunity to receive some honest, third-party feedback on how we're operating. We'll work very

hard to both improve deficiencies and enhance the strengths that are reported. Next, we must deal head-on with our dwindling resources and develop the means to create more stable and predictable funding streams. Inflation, high construction material costs, continued declining federal revenue and deteriorating gas tax dollars all reduce our ability to address regular maintenance and system expansion needs. We must change that negative trend now.

TN – Changing the state and federal governments' allocation of transportation dollars can't happen in one year, can it?

Saenz – You're right. Those are longer-term efforts and we will continue to work on those over time. But there are other financial options out there like private investments, toll funding and even some innovative, time-of-day pricing being looked at in other parts of the country that can help us offset the losses we're seeing in the traditional revenue sources. Our biggest challenge will be to thoroughly address the concerns legislators and the public have regarding these new funding tools.

TN – This past legislative session was tough because there were so many questions about how the new funding options like private investments would operate.

Saenz - Yes. There were stories about foreign companies coming in and taking over Texas roads and uncontrollable toll fees and such. That scared people and rightly so. That's why our communications with legislators and the public throughout the year will be extremely important. We have to quantify our needs, answer the tough questions in detail about new funding opportunities and try to get this state on the road to implementing some solutions. Texas has too much to lose by not addressing its transportation problems. While all that might sound like an impossible task, I'm confident we will get there.


TN – So how can employees help in this effort?

Saenz – Before I answer that question, let me say a couple of things about TxDOT employees. In my previous roles I was able to get around the state and watch our folks work. I saw them leave their own families to work extreme emergencies. I've seen them handle very complex construction

projects and use their own time to help in community projects. And it's all been done in the spirit of public service, so I have a great respect for my fellow employees.

What I need employees to do now is to help us as we go through a budget tightening process. They need to look for more ways to find efficiencies in their jobs. And when they find those efficiencies, tell somebody about it. Some employees have already emailed me with suggestions, and that's great. Next, it will be important for employees to know the big issues. We will do our best to provide information and answer questions, but then the TxDOT story needs to be told to friends and neighbors. In the end, if citizens begin to understand the issues and call for solutions, our legislators will feel more comfortable in letting us implement some new, innovative solutions to our financial problems. This is definitely going to require a team effort. n

## Takin' It to the Streets

#### I-69/TTC Public Outreach Cranks Up

The memorable phone company ad urged people to "reach out and touch someone." That seemed fairly clear and easy to do. TxDOT happens to be in the unenviable position of trying to reach out and touch Texans. And that's not quite as clear or anywhere near as easy.

"About six years ago, state leaders started to actively discuss transportation in the context of reducing congestion, increasing safety, cleaning the air, maintaining the system in place and promoting a healthy Texas economy," said Coby Chase, Government and Public Affairs Director. "In the process of those discussions it became quite clear that we had a mobility crisis and a huge funding shortfall. The proposed solutions to those issues prompted the need for a discussion with the public of the magnitude no one in this state had yet imagined."

encourage that public dialogue, TxDOT scheduled 11 town hall meetings for January for the I-69/TTC project. These first ever town hall meetings are a direct result of public comment that citizens want more opportunities to ask questions and get answers about transportation issues, including the Trans-Texas Corridor. After the town halls, another 46 public hearings will be held so citizens in that area of the state can learn and talk about this potential transportation solution.

So far, TxDOT has conducted 54 public meetings on the I-35 portion of the Trans-Texas Corridor (TTC). Fourteen thousand Texans took advantage of the opportunity to meet with TxDOT officials. They offered some 6,000 comments.

"The traditional public hearing is just not very satisfying for the public," Chase commented. "You get three minutes to have your say, the official nods and calls the next person on the list. We must engage citizens in a more meaningful way and make sure Texans have their say and the opportunity to shape projects."

For starters, the I-69/TTC meetings will be advertised differently. Instead of using the public notice section of the paper, TxDOT is preparing more eye-catching style of ads to get a person's attention. Those ads will be placed in higher readership sections of local papers.

Studies continue to show that television and radio are prime sources of information for people and the internet continues to gain more viewers each year. Consequently, TxDOT has begun to use those communication avenues for the first time on a public issue of this nature.

"In addition to the public town halls and mass media outreach, we'll also continue to meet with public officials, appear on radio shows around the state and do whatever else is possible to get Texans informed and involved," said Chase. "Hopefully, that will be a lot more rewarding than the public hearings of old. It's definitely a new day for Texas transportation in more ways than one."



THE FUTURE OF TRANSPORTATION



#### Indiana

Governor Mitch Daniels describes the state government he inherited as one where dysfunction and inefficiency were rampant. Thus sparked the beginning of Indiana's "Major Moves" plan, a 10-year, statewide transportation plan consisting of 200 new construction and 200 major preservation projects for Indiana highways. Daniels' plan utilized an innovative approach to financing: leasing the 157-mile Indiana Toll Road (ITR) to a private investor. This plan took an undervalued and neglected asset and infused the capital to develop hundreds of other projects to completion. The principal thought behind the plan was that the roadway projects, once finished, could be a tool for economic development. Resistance to the plan was fierce and resulted in "one of the biggest fights the Indiana legislature has ever seen." To gain acceptance of his new approach to jumpstart Indiana's weak infrastructure, Daniels addressed the public's concern regarding investment costs by showing that two-thirds of the tolls paid on the ITR were from out-of-state motorists and that the road itself could be improved and operated by a private firm, using its own money. The result of Daniels' project was the development of several major businesses in Indiana. Since 2005, over 35,000 new jobs were created, and by 2007, amidst a national transportation funding crisis, Indiana was the only state that could claim a fully-funded transportation plan.

#### Pennsylvania

When Governor Ed Rendell became governor of Pennsylvania in 2003, he inherited a transportation system in crisis - miles of highways in poor condition, hundreds of bridges in disrepair, a neglected transit system and an ongoing funding shortage. Not content with the state's reliance on traditional revenue sources, Rendell blazed a trail for Pennsylvania, making radical changes to address the state's transportation needs. Despite the polarizing public debate on whether to fund transit versus highways and bridges, Rendell decided the time had come to put aside special interests in favor of the common interest. Unlike other states, Pennsylvania had provided significant capital and operating funds for public transit using little local or regional contributions. Counties and local governments had no taxing authority for road and bridge maintenance, thus preventing regional decision-making. created a bipartisan Transportation Reform and Funding Commission to make recommendations concerning operations, structure, and funding of public transportation, highways and bridges. The panel recommended tax hikes, fee increases, and leasing the Pennsylvania Turnpike. The governor took these to heart and developed a two-pronged approach—exploring a private lease agreement for the Pennsylvania Turnpike and levying a new 6.17 percent gross-profits tax on oil companies that do business in the state. He cut government spending, improved productivity and implemented additional cost-cutting measures. In 2005, he announced an emergency plan for stop-gap funding for transit and found an additional \$530 million for roads and bridges from his

aggressive cost-cutting actions and leveraging of more federal funds.

#### London

In 2000, when Kenneth Livingstone became London's first-ever directly elected mayor, the city was in the midst of a transportation crisis. Like many American cities, London's traffic was severely congested, which threatened its economic prosperity and its citizens' quality of life. Projected estimates show London's population will grow to more than 8 million people in less than a decade, due largely to its booming economy. However, Mayor Livingstone realized that transportation demand was outstripping the city's growth. In response, he made transportation and congestion major platform issues, stressing the importance of easing congestion by persuading people to use public transportation. To reduce the number of vehicles on the road, Livingston proposed making those who created the congestion pay for using the roadways. His 10-year plan was to create partnerships between London's transportation agencies, the public and the business community. Integral to his plan were essential priorities: reducing congestion, improving bus routes and services, providing better pedestrian security, increasing traffic enforcement, increasing journey time reliability for drivers, reforming street maintenance and raising revenue. Within three months, London's rush-hour traffic had been cut by nearly 20 percent, and rush-hour bus speeds had increased by 15 percent. 📆
